'72 World Championship Road Race

Water-Cooled Yamaha Proves Invincible

West German GP

Finnish ace J. Saarinen riding the newly developed water-cooled works 350 Yamaha convincingly beat G. Agostini on a works MV at the West German 3P, 1st round of this year's road race championship series held at the 14.18-mile Nurburgring on April 30.

In the process Saarinen established an absolute motorcycle record for this circuit at 90.91 mph approx. 5.72 mph faster than Agostini's existing 500cc record. Saarinen's brilliant success on the water-cooled Yamaha turned to be a big shock to MV people, as it was the first GP defeat of 10-times world champion Agostini ever recorded since M. Hailwood retired from the classic events.

Japanese rider H. Kanaya became another star of the West German GP. Riding a 250 TD3, he won the classic event for the first time in his racing career, setting the fastest lap at 9' 46" 1-83.76 mph.

Amazing Speed & Reliability-350cc Yamaha

The 7-lap 350cc race was run in bitterly cold weather. As the flag dropped, Agostini on a works MV rocketed away and went on to complete the opening lap well ahead of Yamaha's Saarinen. On lap 2, however, Saarinen lashed to close on leading Agostini, and took over the lead from him during the 3rd lap. Much to MV people's shock, Agostini's MV was not speed match for Saarinen's water-cooled Yamaha. Yamaha ace relentlessly accelerated his fantastic Yamaha and increased advantages over Agostini lap by lap. He crossed the line some 5.4 sec. ahead of Agostini, eventually. Japanese rider H. Kanaya finished third, riding another water-cooled Yamaha.

Japanese Hope, Kanaya's 250cc Class

The 250cc class race was fought by 61 riders for 6 laps—85.19 miles. West German rider D. Braun on a Maico works machine launched a tough challenge against the most powerful Yamaha machines. Braun held his lead during the first half stage of the race, but H. Kanaya riding a 250cc production racer TD3 pulled ahead of him during lap 4. Kanaya scored his first-ever classic win by some 18.5 sec. margins over Braun.

French GP

J. Saarinen nicknamed 'Flying Finn' repeated his sensational win just one week after the West German GP. The French GP, 2nd round of the series took place at the Clermont Ferrand on May 7. Sarrinen on the water-cooled 350 Yamaha outpaced Agostini's MV in a more impressive way. Even during the first lap Saarinen established a commanding lead over Agostini, and increased it to over-16 sec. on lap 2. His countryman T. Lansivuori on a TR3 also went ahead of Agostini in the meantime.

Both Yamahas fought a hot fight for the lead during the latter half stage of the race, but Saarinen expertly managed to pull away from his rival, and won the race in succession to the West German round.

Reigning champion P. Read on a 250cc Yamaha provided another highlight of the French GP. He led the race from start to finish in a flawless way. H. Kanaya on another Yamaha set the fastest lap at 3' 46" 1 to take a fine third place.

Yamaha Scores Double Victory

5th Round, World Championship Series

'72 world championship road race series came to a middle-stage climax with 5th round TT races organized on the Isle of Man, Great Britain for a week period from June 3 through June 9. Each race was fought over a tricky and punishing 37.75-mile mountain circuit, unfortunately, under unfavorable weather conditions. Especially, main event 250cc class was forced to be postponed to the following day from the scheduled start on June 7, due to continuous heavy rain and thick mist around the mountain sections of the course. Reigning champion P. Read of Great Britain scored his second successive 250cc TT victory, riding a Yamaha

production racer TD3 in a flawless way throughout this 4-lap racing.

Young British Iion C. Mortimer provided another highlight, piloting his water-cooled twin 125cc Yamaha to victory on June 9. He also won this race for a couple of years running on a Yamaha.

Besides, a 350cc Yamaha TR3 ridden by British rider T. Rutter proved to be the fastest and most reliable production racer in the 5-lap 350cc TT on June 3. It took a brilliant second spot just behind reigning champion G. Agostini's works MV.

Yamaha's Close-Fought 250cc Class

Ex-champion R. Gould riding a water-cooled twin Yamaha had set the fastest practice lap at a speed of 100.46 mph to make a definite bid for this year's 250cc TT. Right from the start, the race turned into a 100 mph battle between Gould and reigning champion P. Read. TT course-favorite Read more expertly handled and accelerated his 250cc TD3 to gradually increase time advantage over his archrival Gould. In hot pursuit of a leading pair of

Yamahas, a horde of riders all on seemingly identical Yamaha machines, too, struggled for third place. Close-fought battle between Read and Gould resulted in an over-one ton lap speed even from standing start.

Lap by lap Read continued to enlarge the lead over Gould, still averaging over-100 mph. Eventually, Read finished first with Gould securing the safest second spot well ahead of J. Williams on a Yamaha TD3.



Mortimer Wins 125cc Class

British young rider C. Mortimer who had jumped to the stardom with his spectacular 125cc TT win on a Yamaha the previous year, was most promising for this year's 3-lap battle over a wet 37.75-mile circuit, too. Another rider in the reckoning was G. Parlotti, Italian ace on a works water-cooled twin Morbidelli.

The race started at 11 am, with visibility turning better all around the mountain sections.

Parlotti-mounted Morbidelli rocketed away

first, but closely followed by Mortimer's water-cooled twin. Parlotti managed to maintain his lead over Mortimer until the middle-stage of 2nd lap. He appeared to be trying too hard, and his efforts was followed by the most tragic catastrophe. He lost a control on his machine on very wet and slippery surfaces of the bends on the mountain sections, crashed and was killed at the spot. Mortimer came home first to win the 125cc TT for the second consecutive year.













Yamaha Fishing Contest

Surabaya-Malang Motorcycle Touring -Indonesia





Special 350 R5

Shown below are specially-equipped 350 R5 machines of Yamaha which are intended for use in driving technique tests given by the Japanese police. Those models are equipped with various colored lamps on front and rear.

The lamps are lit in linkage with transmission gear shifting, thus enabling an examiner to effortlessly check to see if a rider is employing a correct gear.
